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NATIONAL SIMULTANEOUS STORY TIME

On Wednesday, 24 May 2023, our school tuned in along with hundreds of thousands of students, teachers, parents and caregivers, all over Australia to the National Simultaneous Storytime (NSS), an annual event held by the Australian Library and Information Association (ALIA). In its 23rd year, NSS is a vibrant and fun event that aims to promote the value of reading and literacy, using an Australian children's book that explores age-appropriate themes, and addresses key learning areas of the National Curriculum for Foundation to Year 6. Last year almost 2.2 million people from 59,000 locations tuned in. Each year a picture book, written and illustrated by an Australian author and illustrator is chosen, with this year's book "The Speedy Sloth", written by Rebecca Young and illustrated by Heath McKenzie. The book explores the concepts of encouraging others, winning, losing and perseverance. We were spoilt for choice this year with not only being able to hear the author read her book, we could also choose to view four other special guest readers. The Foundation class tuned in to the livestream from Sydney Zoo where author Rebecca Young read her book, accompanied by illustrator, Heath McKenzie, teaching viewers how to draw a sloth like Spike from the book. The 1/2 Class were delighted with seeing and hearing a Zookeeper from Singapore Zoo read "The Speedy Sloth" to their resident sloth, Indigo, and her baby, Bubba. The Year 3 Class tuned in to Grant Denyer, Australian TV Personality and Racing Car Driver, who read the book alongside his racing car, much to the delight of the boys! **Helene Thomas**

Following teacher Mr Rob Berlin's recommendation, student Angus Millard was successful in joining the program, with Angus required to travel to Adelaide once a term. With one visit to Adelaide already completed, Angus has had the opportunity to learn 5 new and different coding languages (Shell, CSS, html, C & JavaScript) which will hopefully aid him to pursue a career in digital engineering. Angus has also learned the skill of "transmogrification", which enables a file to be universally opened. Angus has identified a "student run" course for JavaScript as the highlight of the course so far, where a fellow student taught the other 39 students about the JavaScript code. We wish Angus all the best with his studies and work towards creating a university portfolio and look forward to following his progress.

INDUSTRY IMMERSION DAY

On 17 May 2023, the School's Year 9/10 students travelled to Millicent to participate in an Industry Immersion Day, organised by Millicent High School. This event allowed students to travel to various workplaces around the region, to see first-hand what a day in the life of an employee entails, for the respective businesses. Students had the opportunity to visit with and observe the following: Stef's Transport - freight management, finance, driver responsibilities and vehicle maintenance; Teagle Contracting - truck, bulldozer and earth-moving equipment cabin introduction. Other students attended a Health and Childcare Workshop at Millicent High School which included role playing and hands-on learning experiences. The students have highlighted that the workplace visits, showcasing the types of work available, is helpful as they consider the types of work they may like to engage with in the future. Further events will be conducted throughout the year, with the aim to broaden the student's perspectives on careers and employment, while further refining the student's preferences in various businesses around the South East. **Rob Berlin**





YELP - CAMP NARACOORTE

Four students from the 5/6 class - Flint Jones, Madison Carlin, Sharli Manning and Zoe Vandepeer recently attended the Young Environmental Leaders Program camp at the Naracoorte caves. Staying at the Wirreanda campsite, the group participated in many environmental activities, which included learning about "munch lines", the intertwining of living things and the effect of pollution in the forest. The group also participated in animal and bird observation, a forest search to locate boxes containing bones, teeth and fossils and walking the "spec' trail. Day 1 rounded out with a meal of lasagne at the Caves Cafe, a night walk back to camp and a fun quiz night organised by the YELP leaders. Kangaroos feeding greeted us at camp on Day 2, with the final day agenda including a hike, cave exploration and the more challenging task of students being led blindfolded through the bush, to identify certain trees by touch. The camp provided a great opportunity for environmental learning, while also forming connections with students from other schools.
